5. Riverview Terrace Update
- a. 163-unit building. Community partnership kudos to all involved. Hotel stays expire this Friday, 8/12. Lynne shared a housing spreadsheet, demonstrating very limited affordable housing in Lenawee and surrounding counties.
 - b. Nancy B. gave an update on hotel status. Dundee evacuation by Friday (74 people). Adrian Inn will not have enough space for everyone. Looking at Super 8, Hampton Inn and others to supplement.
 - c. MSHDA ESG-CV Emergency Funds request – Similar to the detailed breakdown of the 2022 ESG grant above, Lynne presented and explained the proposal to request ESG-CV funds for the Riverview Terrace emergency in the amount of \$816,600.
 - d. Lynne solicited ideas: PlaneWave/Old Training School, CREEK Enterprises/Old YMCA, the HIVE/Boysville, Herrick Hospital and others were mentioned.
 - e. **Motion to approve ESG-CV emergency request for \$816,600 as presented made by Nancy. Supported by Brian. The motion carried.**
6. Family Promise Launch
- a. New Ministry with Mosaic Church. No one present to present information.
7. Grants
- a. ESG ESG Application Approval
 - i. Slight revision and notice from MSHDA; new amount \$130,446 (\$699 reduction). Lynne shared on the screen the detailed change/deduction is from Rapid Rehousing. Jill motioned to approve the revision as presented in the amount of \$130,446 with Housing Help continuing in the role of Grant Fiduciary and continuing in the role of HARA, seconded by Cara S. **Vote for ESG application as proposed approved by consensus.**
8. Collective Impact Core Update
- a. We shared the definition of the second principle of trauma-informed care: trustworthiness and transparency. Laura and Clint shared about how important these values have played out throughout the Riverview Terrace crisis. Trust is important when working closely together to solve a complex problem. Laying out the problem and seeking input is important for transparency. Clint reminded everyone how important self-care is to all the workers involved in this crisis.
